ONE MAN ON A MISSION TO SHOW HOW ETHANOL IS WRECKING YOUR ENGINE

To leave one of Ed Syrocki's standing-room-only ethanol education seminars is to go home amazed, enlightened, and probably a little upset. Syrocki doesn't just claim ethanol destroys fuel lines, wrecks fuel pumps and clogs accelerators, he lets you see the damage for yourself. Find out why Syrocki is on a one-man grassroots campaign to educate historic vehicle owners about the damage ethanol fuel is doing to their engines. Ed Syrocki just might be the only mechanic in America who's tired of getting paid for his work. "Its about my reputation, my ability to fix an engine." says the owner of EMS Classic Car Care of Warren, Michigan. "It's being called into question because of things I can't control." What Syrocki can't control is what ethanolblended fuel does to his customers' engines. Since 1998, Syrocki has specialized in repairing and maintaining all types of historic vehicles. "From Corvairs to Lamborghinis," he says. "We don't specialize in restoration, we specialize in making these cars run, and run well." Syrocki is plain-spoken and modest about the quality of his work, but the constant parade of customers who travel far and wide to his garage are testament to his integrity and reputation. Since founding EMS Classic Car Care in 1998, feature stories have appeared in a number of automotive magazines and national newspapers. Customers have gone on to present cars at the Meadow Brook Concours and other top shows. Despite the wheelchair and crutches he has used since contracting polio in 1957, Syrocki can be found working under the hood almost every day of the week. But these days, he says, most of his hours seem to be spent diagnosing engine problems caused by ethanol blended fuel. Ethanol - a blend of ethyl alcohol and gasoline (usually 10 percent ethanol), known as EI0 acts as a solvent that is believed to cause problems for older cars with engines not designed for this type of fuel. "In the past three years, work on fuel related repairs has more than doubled," he says. "Gas tanks, floats going bad, fuel pumps, carburettors, where it used to be that most of our work was related to other mechanical problems, now three days every week is spent working on cars with fuel systems damaged by ethanol blended fuel." Since founding the company, Syrocki has always made follow-up calls to customers after their car left his shop to see how the vehicle was performing. "But people started calling me and saying the same problem was back," he says. "And it wasn't just after a long winter sitting period when the car was left in the garage. I found that EI0 damage to a vehicle's fuel systems can begin if the car is left to sit only a few weeks. Based on what I've seen, I believe that with E15

the damage would be almost instantaneous." In the trenches for the last three years, Syrocki has collected cracked and damaged fuel system parts. He's conducted his own fuel tests. When a customer would reappear complaining of the same engine trouble over and over again, Syrocki took the time to show them gas samples so they could see ethanol fuel separation. He tore apart gas tanks and cut open damaged fuel lines to show the effects of ethanol. Then he also told customers what they could do to prevent the damage in the future. "Use a soy-based fuel says (Syrocki additive." Recommends he Shaeffer Oil's Soy Ultra, which encapsulates the damaging water molecules ethanol fuel attracts). "Never let the vehicle sit without topping off the tank and keep your fingers crossed." Finally, one Saturday this past July, Syrocki decided to take his findings and his message to the masses. He opened his garage and on the night of his first free slide show and three hour presentation, every one of the 200 chairs in the place was full. Ethanol Show-And-Tell, "I'm just a mechanic who fixes this stuff," he says. "I'm not a scientist, but people were spellbound. The seminar is like a show-and-tell." Syrocki does for a room full of people what he used to do for customers, one at a time. He's conducted three ethanol education seminars for historic vehicle enthusiasts this summer and is planning more. "I'm volunteering all my time because ethanol is just wrong," he says, adding that he has yet to find a sure-fire cure to help historic vehicle owners completely protect their investment. "I tell people to contact their senators and demand that we just get rid of it." With government subsidies and farmers making money on corn grown for fuel, Syrocki understands that ethanol might never go away. In the meantime, he'd be happy to see states be able to opt out of using ethanol fuel or simply to see a lonely pump in the corner of every filling station that serves up pure unleaded fuel. "I understand the market of those in the business of ethanol. I have a market for repairs," says Syrocki. "I just don't believe in letting damage happen on the backs of others. And I don't like having to do the same job twice." The Historic Vehicle Association has already assisted Ed Syrocki in providing ethanol education materials, information on how to contact lawmakers, sample letters from Individuals and clubs and direction on how to sign our EthaNo Petition. After a bit of a chinwag and a bit of organisation we all headed of to our allocated







in an orderly fashion, as some were a bit slow in getting moving. That all happened without


too much delay and we then headed back to the RACV tent where we were just in time to get into the group photo. We then headed back to

A Bit More on Ethanol

ETHANOL EFFICIENCY

It's said that ... Ethanol is the cheapest way to run your car. In fact ... Efficiency of the fuel affects the costs. Ethanol blend fuels were introduced into the Australian market in the past decade and despite a shaky start with compatibility concerns it soon became a widely available



alternative fuel. The most common ethanol blend fuel is E10 - which contains 10% ethanol and 90% regular unleaded petrol (ULP). Some service stations also offer E5, with 5% ethanol, and there is E85, an 85% blend only suitable for a few vehicles.

E10 has some advantages over ULP. It can be produced in Australia from farming by-products. It also has the ability to absorb extra carbon dioxide from the atmosphere if more crops are grown specifically for its production, although potentially at the expense of food crops. As ethanol is renewable and can be produced in Australia, it can also help reduce Australia's reliance on imported fossil fuels.

However, in the current marketplace, ethanol is not a cost-effective alternative for motorists. A 2009 RACV study found that a vehicle running E10 would use around 3.4% more fuel, due to ethanol having a lower energy content than petrol. For a ULP price of 140 cents per litre (cpl), E10 will normally be 1-2 cpl less than ULP making it up to 1.4% cheaper to fill a tank with E10.

However, that tank of E10 will not take the vehicle as far, meaning the actual running cost is around 1.9% more than ULP.

A GLEAR OUTLOOK

A clean windscreen is an essential component of car safety, as dirty or cloudy windows can reduce visibility and increase the effects of glare. Although it can be difficult to achieve that new-car clear windscreen, it is possible if you follow some simple tips. Importantly, you don't need expensive cleaners, just some time and effort.



For interior windscreen cleaning:

Wipe over the glass with a clean and dry micro-fibre cloth.

Spray the glass surface with an automotive glass cleaner. Turn the micro-fibre cloth to the clean side and wipe the top edges of the windscreen. This prevents dirt stuck in this area from travelling down and dirtying the glass after you've cleaned it. Switch to a clean cloth and spray the edges of the windscreen again and wipe clean. Wipe the remaining, larger area of the glass - spray with more cleaner as necessary. Wipe over the entire surface once more with a clean dry cloth.

Pour a little white vinegar on a clean micro-fibre cloth and wipe over glass surface. This will create a clear and sparkling finish.



Wipe half of the glass surface with a clean cloth. Spray the area with an automotive glass cleaner then wash it off. Dry this area with a clean and dry towel. Then repeat steps 1 and 2 on the other half of the windscreen. Pour a little white vinegar on a clean micro-fibre cloth and wipe over glass surface and you'll get that same clear and sparkling finish.

"If your vehicle has tinted windows, ensure you use products that are suitable for those surfaces. Just as a dirty windscreen poses safety concerns, so does a damaged windscreen. If you notice a chip, crack or scratch on your windscreen while cleaning, then attend to it ASAP. Reprinted from the Royal Auto.
