When we packed up our gear and were ready to leave a couple of guys with a Ute & trailer, with a BBQ, blocked some


of us in while they unloaded the BBQ. Lots of laughter took place at this occurrence.

Once again, Pascoe Vale Car Show has come around. This is the first car show on the annual





# Kingsford Charcoal

Peter sent in a story on Kingsford Charcoal. I have expanded on what he sent which makes you wonder what this has to do with a car newsletter. Well read on.

Kingsford is a brand of charcoal used for grilling, along with related products. The brand is owned by The Clorox Company. Currently, the Kingsford Products Company remains the

leading manufacturer of charcoal in the US, enjoying 80 percent market share. More than 1 million tons of wood scraps are converted into charcoal briquettes annually.

<u>History:</u> The Ford Motor Company sold more than one million Ford Model T's in 1919, and each of those Model T's used 100 board feet of wood for the parts such as frame, dashboard, steering wheels and wheels. Because of the amount of wood that had to be used in the cars,



Henry Ford decided he wanted to produce his own supply. He enlisted the help of Edward G. Kingsford, a real estate agent in Michigan, to find him a supply of wood. Coincidentally, Kingsford's wife was a cousin of Ford - making the partnership a reality. In the early 1920s, Ford acquired large timberland in Iron Mountain, Michigan, and built a sawmill and parts plant in a

neighboring area (which became Kingsford, Michigan). The mill and plants produced sufficient parts for the car but generated waste such as stumps, branches and sawdust. Ford suggested that all wood scraps were to be processed into charcoal.




A University of Oregon chemist, Orin Stafford, had invented a method for making pillow-shaped lumps of fuel from sawdust and mill waste combined with tar and bound together with cornstarch. He called the lumps "charcoal briquettes." Thomas Edison designed the briquette factory next to the sawmill, and Kingsford ran it. It was a model of efficiency, producing 610 lb (280 kg) of briquettes for every ton of scrap wood. The product was sold only through Ford dealerships. Ford then named the new business Ford Charcoal and changed the name of the charcoal blocks to "briquettes". At the beginning, the charcoal was sold to meat and fish smokehouses, but supply exceeded demand.

By the mid-1930s, Ford was marketing "Picnic Kits" containing

charcoal and portable grills directly from Ford dealerships, capitalizing on the link between motoring and outdoor adventure that his own Vagabond travels popularized. "Enjoy a modern

picnic," the package suggested. "Sizzling broiled meats, steaming coffee, toasted sandwiches." It wasn't until after World War II that backyard barbecuing took off, thanks to suburban migration, the invention of the Weber grill and the marketing efforts. An investment group bought Ford Charcoal in 1951 and renamed it to Kingsford Charcoal in honor of Edward G. Kingsford (and the factory's home-base name) and took over the operations. The plant was later acquired by Clorox in 1973.

The raw materials, primarily wood waste from regional sawmills, are delivered to the factory. The wood waste is fed into pits to undergo magnetic filtration to remove any metallic parts. The wood waste is then ground into fine particles and whisked with hot air to remove any moisture. The wood particles are later processed through a large furnace with multiple hearths (called a

retort) in a controlled-oxygen atmosphere. The particles are stacked in batches in a kiln that chars the wood without burning in a controlled-oxygen atmosphere. The wood is progressively charred as it drops from one hearth to the next. The charred wood particles are combined with the other ingredients, press formed into pillow-shaped briquettes and dried out before being packaged to be sold.

After leaving Penola it started to cool off and as we approached Mount Gambier it





# Why We'll Miss The Ford factory.

# A month before Ford Australia closed its factory doors forever, it's worth pausing to remember what we're losing

In early 1971 Geelong was known as Ford Town, and the Blue Oval was on a roll.

The XY Falcon GTHO Phase III had just been released and Allan Moffat defended his Bathurst 500 title in 'the world's fastest sedan' that October, when 'Hoeys' claimed the top three places, and the first fully Australian designed, engineered and manufactured Ford – the third-generation XA Falcon – entered production late that year.


Of course, this was well before Holden's first Commodore — based on Germany's Opel Rekord — arrived in 1978, but support for it fell away as Aussies turned back to the traditional large car,

in the form of the Falcon.

Ford eventually claimed the title of Australia's most popular car from Holden, after it introduced the alloyhead six-cylinder engine in the 'XD½' model of 1980, and claimed Australian market leadership for the first time in 1982.

It took until the VT Commodore of 1996 for Holden's home grown large car to regain the mantle of Australia's most popular car from its direct Ford rival, the EL Falcon.

Ford's Australian car-making history dates back to 1925 when the Geelong factory was built and first



The same year saw the Geelong Cats win their first national Aussie Rules premiership, backed by Ford, and that unbroken, world-record 95-year sponsorship deal continues today.

When I grew up in Geelong, the whole town lived and breathed Ford. My dad worked at Ford, my uncle worked at Ford and, like most Geelong school-leavers, I too went to work at Ford's historic Geelong plant, at least on night-shift while I studied journalism at Deakin Uni.

Over 56 years, Falcon has become the longest running vehicle name in Australian motoring history, and the oldest surviving car nameplate in the 113-year history of the Ford Motor Company. Only Ford's F-Series truck and the discontinued Lincoln Continental limo date back further, to 1948 and 1939 respectively.

All that ends on October 7, when Ford closes the doors to its Geelong and Broadmeadows factories for the last time, and the last of more than 3.5 million Falcon sedans, wagons, ute's and vans (not to mention long-wheelbase Fairlane's and LTD's) rolls off the line.

Various factors have been blamed for Ford's – and Australia's – car manufacturing demise, but the truth is probably a combination of a strong local currency, import tariff reductions and a unionised, overpaid workforce making the industry uncompetitive in the face of a flood of high-value Asian imports.

Is it better for a government to directly subsidise the nation's car manufacturing industry to create and maintain jobs, as most successful car-making nations do, or to directly fund the larger number of welfare recipients when it no longer exists? I guess we'll soon find out.

Yes, unlike Holden and Toyota, Ford Australia's vehicle development legacy will live on post-manufacturing, when more than 1000 engineers and designers will continue to create models from the ground up Down Under.

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
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
